Description: This is the second semester of an introduction to calculus for students in the biological, social, and management sciences, and architecture. Applications of calculus to these disciplines form an important part of the course. Concrete calculations are emphasized.

Note: This is a terminal math course. It does not serve as a prerequisite for other math courses.

Exams: October 6, November 3, December 8.

Each student must bring his or her University picture ID card to the exams. Makeup exams will not be given unless a student can present substantial evidence that an absence was caused by serious illness, a death in the immediate family, religious observance, participation in University activities at the request of University authorities, or compelling circumstances beyond the student's control. For an illness, you must present a signed statement from a doctor that your illness was sufficiently serious to make you miss an exam. A note saying only that you visited the doctor or the Health Center will not suffice.

If the absence is caused by foreseeable circumstances, notice must be given **in advance** in order to be allowed to take a makeup exam. Students who do not provide adequate documentation for their absence will receive a score of zero for the exam.

Each exam is worth 100 points and will last 75 minutes.

Quizzes and Homework: There is a list of homework problems for each section that will be covered. These problems should be done by the student, but are not to be handed in. Instead, in the Monday discussion section, there will be a short quiz consisting of around 2 or 3 problems taken directly from the homework list. The sections covered by a quiz will be as listed on the syllabus. The lowest 2 quiz scores for the semester will be dropped. At the end of the term, the total quiz score for the remaining quizzes will be converted to a 50 point basis. The rules for makeup quizzes are the same as those listed above for exams.

Final Exam: Thursday, December 15, 1:30-3:30pm. You must bring your University picture ID to the final. The final exam will count 150 points and will last 2 hours.

Grades: Each midterm is worth 100 points. The final is worth 150 points. The quizzes total 50 points. That makes 500 possible points for the course. You should expect that 450-500 will be an A, 400-449 will be a B, 350-399 will be a C, 300-349 will be a D, and 0-299 will be an F.

Calculators: Calculators will be allowed for all quizzes. Calculators will **not** be allowed on exams.
